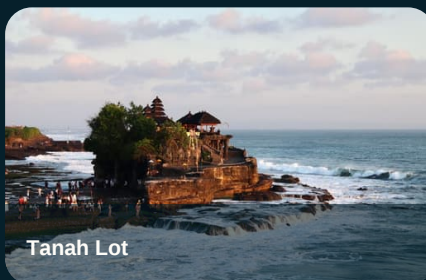

INTERNATIONAL HOLIDAY PLANNING BRIEF

Destination overview

Bali is one island in Indonesia's long archipelago, and it carries a distinctive Hindu culture visible in daily offerings, temple ceremonies and community life - offerings laid on doorsteps each morning, gamelan drifting from courtyards, priests blessing visitors with water. The landscape changes quickly: dark volcanic and pale coral sand along the south coast, terraced rice fields cut into the hills around Ubud, and a spine of craters and caldera lakes down the middle. Indian travellers can reach Bali directly from some metros or with a connection through a major Asian hub, depending on their origin and dates. Bali suits couples wanting culture alongside a beach, families comfortable with heat, humidity and scooter-heavy roads, and first-time international travellers who want somewhere genuinely foreign without being difficult.

Uluwatu Temple

TEMPLE | 2-3 HOURS

A Balinese sea temple set on a sheer limestone cliff above the Indian Ocean at the island's southern tip. Visitors follow the clifftop walkway for long ocean views, keep an eye on the resident macaques known for snatching sunglasses, and often stay on for the evening Kecak fire dance in the open amphitheatre.



Tanah Lot

TEMPLE | 2-3 HOURS

A small temple built on a rock formation just offshore on Bali's western coast, cut off by the tide for part of each day. Visitors walk the shoreline path, cross to the base at low tide, browse the market stalls behind it and stay for sunset, which is when it is busiest.



Tegalalang Rice Terraces (Ubud)

VIEWPOINT | 1-2 HOURS

Steep, hand-cut paddy terraces filling a narrow valley north of Ubud and watered by Bali's traditional subak irrigation system. Visitors descend the stepped paths between the tiers, cross small bamboo bridges, pause at cafes overlooking the slope and photograph the terraces from the roadside viewpoints above.



Mount Batur sunrise trek

VIEWPOINT | HALF DAY (PRE-DAWN START)

An active volcano in Bali's north-east, climbed in the dark so that walkers reach the rim at first light. The ascent takes roughly two hours on loose volcanic scree with a guide, and the summit looks across the caldera to Lake Batur and, on clear mornings, towards Mount Agung.



Seminyak / Kuta beaches

BEACH | HALF DAY

Two adjoining stretches of west-coast sand south of Denpasar. Kuta has wide, gently shelving surf popular with beginner surf schools and a dense strip of shops behind it; Seminyak, just to the north, is quieter and more spread out, with beach clubs, sunset loungers and a stronger dining scene.



Ubud Monkey Forest

NATURE RESERVE | 1-2 HOURS

A protected patch of forest in central Ubud that is both a nature reserve and a temple complex, home to several groups of long-tailed macaques. Visitors follow paved paths past mossy stone carvings and a ravine bridge; the monkeys are wild, so food, bags and loose items are best kept out of sight.



Tirta Empul Temple

TEMPLE | 1-2 HOURS

A working Hindu water temple near Tampaksiring, built around a spring that feeds a row of stone bathing pools. Balinese families come to perform melukat, a purification ritual, moving from spout to spout. Visitors may join with a sarong and a change of clothes, or simply watch from the walkway.



Nusa Penida

ISLAND | FULL DAY

A rugged limestone island south-east of Bali, reached by fast boat from Sanur in well under an hour. Day trips take in the Kelingking Beach cliff viewpoint, Broken Beach and Angel's Billabong, with snorkelling stops for manta rays. Island roads are rough and the cliff paths steep and largely unfenced.

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

Travel essentials

CURRENCY

The Indonesian rupiah is used throughout Bali. Cards are accepted at hotels and larger restaurants, while warungs, markets and drivers usually prefer cash.

LANGUAGE

Indonesian is the national language and Balinese is spoken locally. English is widely understood across tourist areas, hotels, restaurants and transport services.

TIME DIFFERENCE

Bali is 2 hours 30 minutes ahead of Indian Standard Time (IST).

WEATHER

Tropical and warm year round, with a dry season from around April to October and a humid, wetter season bringing heavy afternoon downpours from November onwards.

CONNECTIVITY

Indian roaming packs work but local prepaid SIMs and eSIMs are easy to arrange, and Wi-Fi is common in hotels, villas and cafes.

VISA AND PERMITS

Indian passport holders should confirm current Indonesian visa or visa-on-arrival eligibility before departure. Passport validity and onward-travel conditions apply; also check Bali's official tourist-levy requirements.

Food and culture

Balinese meals centre on rice, sambal and spice pastes; satay lilit and babi guling contain meat, while gado-gado, tempeh and tofu support vegetarian diets. Halal food is less common than in Java. Temple visitors need a sarong and sash, covered shoulders and respectful conduct.

AIR, RAIL AND ROAD

Getting there from India

AIR

Ngurah Rai International Airport serves Bali. Indian travellers may find direct services from selected metros or one-stop routes through Southeast Asian hubs.

RAIL

There is no rail connection between India and Bali. Rail in Indonesia does not extend to the island.

ROAD

Road travel begins after arrival. A car with driver is practical, but traffic between the southern coast and Ubud can make short map distances slow.

FROM OUR PLANNERS

Practical notes

- The currency is the Indonesian rupiah and prices run into hundreds of thousands, so check the number of zeros before paying and use bank ATMs rather than standalone machines.
- Carry your own sarong and sash in the day bag - they are compulsory at every temple, and the rental queues at popular sites move slowly.
- Traffic drives on the left as in India, but roads are narrow and scooter-dense; a car with a driver is far more practical than self-driving.
- Tipping is not obligatory; many restaurants already add a service and tax charge, and rounding up for drivers and guides is the usual courtesy.
- The drier season runs roughly April to October; December to February brings heavy afternoon downpours that close waterfall paths and cancel Nusa Penida boats.
- The Grab and Gojek apps work in most areas, but some beach and Ubud neighbourhoods restrict app pickups in favour of local transport co-operatives.
